LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

Dear Friends.

YIVO's 100th year celebrates an institution that has been continuously devoted to an idea and a people. The idea is that our people will exist as long as we possess knowledge of our history, customs, and creative energy; our religious, social, and political ambitions; our languages, our highest aspirations, and our deepest tragedies. It is an inclusive vision, constantly evolving, always creatively reconceiving itself, yet never losing the thread of its connection to our people. YIVO's role is not simply to conserve the past but to enable living knowledge of centuries of Jewish life in Eastern Europe and Russia and throughout the world today to help build our future. That is our mission and we are still accomplishing it. In 2022, YIVO completed its historic project of digitizing all of its pre-war archives in Lithuania and in New York. It took 7 years and 7 million dollars. The entire YIVO community worldwide rallied around this task, and we are grateful.

Out of this project, some 1.5 million documents were put online. In 2023, some 350,000 individuals used these materials online for free. In 2024, this figure grew to an astounding nearly 700,000 individuals around the world.

What does this tell us? It tells us that within the global Jewish world there is a deep, abiding hunger to be reconnected with our past, one that these materials help to satisfy for the first time in 100 years. Doing so is an act of resistance, an affirmation of selfhood and identity that could not be destroyed by the Nazis, the Soviets, emigration, or even the vast waves of assimilation, forced or unforced, that have washed over us for centuries.

That number of 700,000 will continue to grow. These materials are now the basis of educational initiatives throughout the world, including YIVO's Online Museum, our new Learning and Media Center to be launched officially in mid-2025, and our work in creating the first Master's Degree program in Yiddish Civilization. New musical projects and literary works have flowed from the reconnection with this past; films and works of art have been made from them. YIVO's current project to digitize the archives and the collections of the Bund (the Jewish Labor and Political Archives project) will add some 3.5 million documents, most previously unknown to the general public, to this online resource. At a time when the existence of the Jewish people has been questioned in the State of Israel, when Jewish students cannot feel safe in their colleges and universities, and when Jewish artists and writers are not welcome at museums, galleries, and publishing houses here and abroad, the need for this connection and reconnection has never been greater.

Celebrating YIVO is celebrating the Jewish people as a whole. Let us all take pride in these accomplishments as we work together, with your support, to secure our future.

Program Highlights

Nusakh Vilne Memorial

(SEPTEMBER 29, 2024) Every year, YIVO holds a memorial to commemorate the Jewish community of Vilna, where it was founded. This year, Bret Werb discussed Shmerke Kaczerginski's work collecting songs of the Holocaust. Kaczerginski was a member of the Paper Brigade, risking his life during World War II to hide Jewish cultural items, smuggling them back into the Vilna Ghetto. Following the discussion, Temma Schaechter and Binyumen Schaechter performed a mini concert featuring musical settings of his poetry.

Jewish Folk Medicine in Eastern Europe

(NOVEMBER 11, 2024) Marek Tuszewicki discussed his book A Frog Under the Tongue, in a conversation moderated by cultural critic Rokhl Kafrissen. Tuszewicki shared insights into Ashkenazi healing traditions, blending kabbalistic methods, folk remedies, and magical incantations, while exploring how modern medicine reshaped these practices. The talk shed light on little-known aspects of Ashkenazi culture, and on how the need to treat sickness brought Jews and their neighbors together.

Proof of Identity

(DECEMBER 5, 2024) YIVO hosted the US Premiere of Proof of Identity, a documentary from the POLIN: Museum of the History of Polish Jews that explores what it means to be a Polish Jew today. Through interviews with a variety of Jews residing in Poland today, the documentary examines how Polish Jews define their own identity at different stages of life. The screening was followed by a discussion with the film's director Mikołaj Grynberg, Columbia University Film Professor Annette Insdorf, and Head of the Exhibition Department at the POLIN Museum Joanna Fikus.

Inside an Archival Box

For the YIVO Learning and Media Center's (YLMC) first pilot visit in May of 2023, we created a classroom set of archival boxes for teaching a lesson dedicated to the YIVO Youth Autobiography Contests of the 1930s. These boxes—full of high-quality reproductions of archival materials—have since been used dozens of times to teach visiting high school, college, and adult groups about the lives of Jewish youths in interwar Poland.

In response to feedback we received through surveys and discussions with educators, we decided that our next series of Archival Box Lessons would center on the story of the Paper Brigade and cultural resistance within the Vilna Ghetto. For this lesson, we created four boxes, each dedicated to a different Paper Brigade member—Zelig Kalmanovitch, Rachela Pupko-Krinsky, Herman Kruk, and Avrom Sutzkever. Each box features reproductions of materials from RG 223, the Sutzkever-Kaczerginski Collection, and is accompanied by an excerpt of a memoir or diary in translation which sheds light on the Paper Brigade's work and life in the Vilna Ghetto. The featured materials touch on the ghetto school system, theater, and library and include reproductions of historical documents that the Paper Brigade saved from destruction, including manuscripts of Y. L. Peretz and Sh. An-ski, a diary from a young Theodor Herzl, and an autobiography of a Jewish youth submitted to one of the YIVO autobiography contests.

We debuted our new lesson with a group of students from The Dalton School in October of 2024 and look forward to sharing this lesson with many more visiting groups soon. Here are a few documents featured in these new boxes:

Construction Has Begun on YIVO's Learning and Media Center!

Since May 2023, YIVO has been hosting pilot lessons with visiting groups of students from a variety of high schools and universities, including The Frisch School, Stuyvesant High School, Riverdale Country School, The Dalton School, Columbia University, and Sarah Lawrence College, among others. YIVO has used these pilot lessons to inform the design of its Learning and Media Center—a new publicly accessible exhibition and classroom area slated to open during YIVO's centennial celebration in mid-2025.

The Learning and Media Center will include a classroom to host visiting groups for lessons which draw on our archival materials, cases that will display artifacts from YIVO's Archives and Library, year-round exhibitions, an intimate open stacks library of Yiddish and English books, stations to listen to sound recordings and watch videos from YIVO's collections, and more.

YIVO Meets with the Ukrainian Ambassador to the United States

This award, a collaborative initiative between YIVO and the Martynas Mažvydas National Library of Lithuania, aims to honor individuals who signifi-

During the event, Ambassador Audra Plepytė expressed gratitude to YIVO for its vital efforts over the past century in preserving Lithuania's prewar history and culture, which had been obscured during the 50 years of Soviet occupation following World War II. Aušrinė Žilinskienė, Director General of the Martynas Mažvydas National Library of Lithuania, conveyed her congratulations to YIVO and addressed attendees through a video message. Additionally, Jonathan Brent spoke about the organization's historical significance and future endeavors. A Jewish Labor Committee Appeal **Booklet to Support the Jewish** Children Who Survived the Holocaust

This in an appeal booklet that comes from YIVO's Jewish Labor Committee collection. It seeks support for Jewish children who had survived the Holocaust and were living in one of the children's homes built and run by the Jewish Labor Committee. With texts in Yiddish and English, the booklet was distributed to Jewish children attending one of the Arbeter Ring schools in the United States. In an effort to help the children in the US connect with those in Europe, it features photographs of daily activities in JLC-supported homes in France and Belgium. The booklet reminds the children in the US that they are fortunate to have everything they need: "You have warm homes, you have love and affection, devoted parents, you have good schools, food and clothing." In contrast, the booklet states bluntly, "But the children overseas have none of that," and implores those in the US to "collect penny by penny" to help the JLC supply Europe's surviving Jewish youth with winter coats, shoes, warm underwear, toys, and textbooks.

YIVO is now in the midst of an eight-year project to digitize these unparalleled materials and make them available for free access online.





RECENT ACCESSION

The Collection of The Reverend Samuel Arluck (1882-1953)

YIVO received items relating to The Reverend Samuel Arluck (1882-1953), father of the famed American composer Harold Arlen whose catalog of over 500 songs includes the beloved "Over the Rainbow" and "Get Happy." Surely Harold inherited his musical talent from his father, who was born in Vilna in 1882, immigrated to Louisville, Kentucky in 1887, and became a famed cantor leading congregations in Buffalo and Syracuse, New York. The collection consists of ephemera relating to Samuel Arluck's personal life and career and includes a framed oil painting of Cantor Arluck on the bimah at Temple Adath Yeshurum in Syracuse, New York. This painting was created in the 1950s by Harold Arlen.

LIBRARY HIGHLIGHT

Why is this Journal Different from All Other Journals?

Educating children outside of the classroom can come in many forms, from traditional books to children's journals, with one such being Kinder zhurnal. Unlike other children's journals, which are primarily for entertainment, Kinder zhurnal was founded by the Sholem Aleichem Folk Institute for the purpose of organizing a secular Yiddish school system. Beginning in 1920, Kinder zhurnal published works by Yiddish writers and poets, from Mani Leib to Kadya Molodowsky, with themes relating to Judaism.

The theme of the April 1949 edition of Kinder zhurnal focused on Passover. On the cover is Moses splitting the red sea while the Jews observe the miracle. The first page has a poem written by Y. L. Kaloshiner about celebrating Passover from a child's perspective. Next to the poem is a picture of a family reading their haggadot. The caption states, "What is more beautiful than a Jewish home on Passover with a seder?" referring to the ritual of the first two nights of Passover.



Meeting Sam Philips: How Newly Translated Letters and Research at YIVO Helped Us Get to **Know Our Grandfather**

Our grandfather, Sam Philips, had ten grandchildren, none of whom, now elders ourselves, can recall him speaking. To us, he was a cipher—a small, silent house painter. That is, until his 60-plus letters, published in The Forward from the 1940s to 1960s, were translated from Yiddish this past year. Through that pro-



cess, we learned that he was born in the Polish shtetl Biała Rawska, about his life there as a yeshiva-bokher (a young, male yeshiva student), before immigrating to America at age 17.

His prolific, heartfelt, highly literate, well-argued Yiddish letters elucidated his life and ideas. We now know that he was deeply involved in the New York socialist Yiddish world as a worker, an intellectual, and an activist. He wrote in real time about such diverse topics as the murder of Jews in Europe, the establishment of the state of Israel, kosher meat prices in New York, labor laws in New York State, and Yiddish in America. In sum, the letters demonstrate his belief in the importance of his own contributions, those of an everyman, to ongoing Jewish conversations.

We concur with our translator, Tara Neuwirth, who undertook this work while attending the 2024 YIVO summer intensive Yiddish program, that this project "could have only happened at YIVO." Conducting research in the Archives, helped by her instructors, classmates and archivists, she found additional materials, including our grandfather's contributions to the Biała Rawska yizkor (memorial) book. While this project has produced not only a plethora of answers, it has also raised even more questions, questions that we hope to pursue further.

Microfilm Digitization

This year, the YIVO Archives completed a major project: digitizing all of its microfilmed holdings. Over 100 collections are now digitized and freely available online. These materials are diverse, ranging from major collections on the Holocaust to the records of the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society to material from the oldest Jewish congregation in America, Congregation Shearith Israel, dating back to the 18th century.

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Winter Classes at YIVO

Held annually since 2012, the YIVO-Bard Winter Program on Ashkenazi Civilization explores Ashkenazi Jewish life and culture throughout its thousand-year history in Eastern Europe and the diaspora. This year, in celebration of YIVO's 100th anniversary, the program featured courses illuminating developments over the past century in music, literature, history, science and more. The program featured a diverse lineup of international presenters and scholars—of international and national presenters including historian Hasia Diner, film critic J. Hoberman, scholars and writers Sander Gilman, Jan Grabowski, Adam Kirsch, and Pulitzer Prize winner Anne Applebaum, along with instructors from leading institutions across the globe. The program enables participants to engage with the Jewish Ashkenazi experience with courses not typically found outside of the university setting.

The keynote event "Autocracies in the 21st Century" featured Anne Applebaum in conversation with Jonathan Brent. They explored how authoritarian regimes have evolved to collaborate across industries, borders, and technologies to stay in power.

Concurrent with the Winter Program, YIVO ran a series of winter Yiddish seminars. These seminars covered topics such as Yiddish music, Jewish food, Yiddish theater, and Jewish history. Over 250 students participated in the Winter Program and winter Yiddish seminars.

Yiddish Metropolitan Diary: A Subway Encounter


Mayn tayer yidish togbikhl (Dear Yiddish diary):

It was a brisk yet sunny Saturday afternoon in mid-December. I was sitting on a crowded 1 train, amid a long and ruminative trek downtown from Riverdale. As is my wont during such commutes, I took out my Yiddish homework, which in this case was preparation of an excerpt from Bella Chagall's memoir Burning Lights, the chapter "Der ershter shney" ("The First Snow").

Suddenly, a voice resounded from above: "Ah, redt ir yidish? (You speak Yiddish?)" I looked up: my reading happened to be in the direct line of vision of a man with a beard, standing and holding the subway pole! Before I knew it, I was responding in Yiddish, and thus began a conversation on all manners of topics lasting from 137th St. down to Lincoln Center, completely in Yiddish!

As I neared my destination, it was clear that this yidishe discussion had to continue (especially as, musician that I am, I was greatly relishing this ershte [first] opportunity to discuss Mahler, Wagner, and Scriabin all in the mameloshn [mother-tongue], quite joyfully off-kilter as every encounter with this fantastisher [fantastic] language has thus far promised to be)... He dictated his cell number to me (in Yiddish, of course), and the shmues (conversation) is still going on, weeks later (if with the admitted assistance of the verterbukh [dictionary])!



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
